## **Become a Councillor**

St Blaise Town Council is calling local people to have their voices heard at the forthcoming Local Elections. St Blaise Town Council represents the Parish of St Blaise which is a far greater area than the Town of St Blazey and is an area decided by the Cornwall Council. The Parish Council is NON POLITICAL.

Some people think their opinions don't count or that local action won't make a difference. The reality is if you vote you help decide what gets done. It is important that you have your say on local matters.

Local Councils are consulted on many issues in their areas and deliver many services and therefore voting in the upcoming local elections will have an impact on the local community. Our Town Councillors live side by side with you and can be contacted easily and are answerable to you.

Local Councils depend on local people taking an interest in what is happening in the Community and local people standing for election. We need your local knowledge.

Whatever needs changing in this neighbourhood, you could be just the person to change it by becoming a local councillor. No other role gives you a chance to make such a huge difference to quality of life for people in your local area.

#### WHAT DO COUNCILLORS DO?

Councillors are elected to the local council to represent their local community, so they must either live or work in the area. Becoming a councillor is both a rewarding and privileged form of public service. You will be in a position to make a difference to the quality of other people's daily lives and prospects.

Being an effective councillor requires both commitment and hard work. Councillors have to balance the needs and interests of residents. These will all make demands on a councillor's time, on top of the demands and needs of their personal and professional lives.

#### HOW DO I BECOME A COUNCILLOR?

If you are thinking of standing as an independent candidate you can contact your Cornwall Council's electoral services department prior to May 4<sup>th</sup> 2017 when elections are next taking place alternatively you can contact the Town Clerk.

You must make sure that you are officially nominated as the election date draws nearer. These papers are available from your local council's democratic services department or the Town clerk. You must also give your consent in writing to your nomination. All the necessary documents must be submitted 19 working days before the day of the election. The total crimes recorded over August, September and October were 74 for St Blazey, crimes recorded for the same months in 2015 were 50, showing a 48% increase. There were also more calls/logs to the Police this year.

The three priorities remain as speeding traffic, anti-social behaviour and parking issues at Biscovey/Lesnewth.
